In response to Mayfield's ongoing recovery from the tornadoes of 2021 and process of envisioning a new future, students from the Landscape Architecture Department at the University of Kentucky's College of Agriculture, Food and Environment are developing design concepts for important spaces in Mayfield's downtown. The map shows the student project sites that were identified through the work of Mayfield Rebuilds and planning efforts led by landscape architects on the Bell Engineering team.

Opportunities to Participate

To ensure that the students' work addresses and responds to community needs and aspirations, UK's Landscape Architecture Studio is traveling to Mayfield twice this spring. In early February, students listened to and learned from community members, saw the town, documented their projecties, and collected stories, suggestions and feedback.





Organize community events to plant trees

While the tornado destroyed homes and businesses. It also obliterated trees and foliage in its path. Replacing this green material is important, not only to improve the visual landscape, but for the long term health of the community.

An urban canopy helps to reduce the effects of a heat island being created. Shade generated by mature trees can reduce temperatures by up to 15 degrees. The longevity of hard surfaces, such as buildings, roofs, and asphalt can be increased by many years when School groups such as Future Farmers of not directly exposed to the sun.

Foliage helps to absorb harmful substances in the air, thus helping to improve human health. Trees and plantings provide buffers for noises and habitat for wildlife.

Tree-lined streets draw more people and increases the walkability of an area.

While trees are mostly beneficial, care must be given to choosing the right tree for the right place. Studies will need to be conducted to find the most appropriate and natural species for our region.

A tree planting campaign is an excellent opportunity to engage local students in becoming involved in their community. America could be engaged to help with all aspects of this project, especially providing labor for planting and maintaining the




